#### 1. Minutes of Park Board meeting

#### MINUTES OF BOARD OF PARK COMMISSIONERS MEETING OF MAY 21, 2009

A meeting of the Board of Park Commissioners of the City of De Pere was held on Thursday, May 21, 2009 at 6:30 pm at the Community Center, 600 Grant Street, De Pere. A brief tour of the Community Center began at 6:15 p.m. Members present: Bill Volpano, Kathy Van Vonderen, Mike Donovan, Sue Schinkten, James Boyd. Rod Kowalczyk (came in at 6:40 pm). Excused Absence: George Brown. Also present: Marty Kosobucki, Director, Paula Rahn, Community Center Manager, Lori Pazdera, Senior Programmer.

- Minutes of Board of Park Commissioners meeting. (Attachment)
   Mike Donovan moved to approve the minutes; motion seconded by James Boyd. Motion passed.
- 2. Open discussion on Community Center and usage. Sue Schinkten moved to open the meeting to the public; motion seconded by Mike Donovan. Motion passed. Paula Rahn gave an overview of the usage of the Community Center and reported that overall all of the users are very satisfied with the Community Center. She reported that the Community Center has more than 2,000 paid rentals per year. The majority of the Recreation programs are held at the Community Center. Jim DeFrance, De Pere Men's Club, 1873 Lemon Lane, De Pere, gave a brief overview of the Men's Club. The Men's Club meets at the Community Center every Tuesday morning. They have several members volunteering for the Nutrition Program where they deliver 71 meals to homebound people on a daily basis. They hold several fundraisers throughout the year and donate to several organizations within the City. He had a concern regarding the recent change in the voting location. Now the voting booths are set up on the first floor, which affects the Nutrition Program and he was hoping that this could be set up on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Floor of the Community Center where it had originally been located. Cathy Huppert, 873 W. St. Francis Road spoke on behalf of the De Pere Women's Club. They meet at the Community Center the second Wednesday of the month. Cathy mentioned the Women's Club is very happy with the Community Center facilities. One thought she wanted to address is the rental fee for the kitchen storage and was wondering if that could be waived or reduced. Mary Schall, 708 N. Michigan St., De Pere, spoke on behalf of the Brown County's Women's Club. Mary commented the group is very happy with the Community Center facilities. Sue Schinkten moved to go back into regular session; motion seconded by Mike Donovan. Motion passed.
- 3. Action on Simplex contract extension for the Community Center to monitor and maintain access control system. (Attachment)
- 4. Action on A & A Fire and Security contract extension for the Community Center for security, fire and elevator monitoring. (Attachment)
- 5. Action on A & A Fire and Security contract extension for the Community Center for security system maintenance. (Attachment)
- 6. Action on A & A Fire and Security contract extension for the Community Center for fire alarm inspection and preventative maintenance.

Discussion was held on Item Nos. 3 thru 6. Mike Donovan moved to approve and forward to Council for their approval. Kathy Van Vonderen seconded the motion. Motion passed.

7. Request from the Town of Ledgeview to have non-resident fees waived for recreational soccer league players. (Attachment)

The Board discussed the letter dated March 16, 2009, from Jeff Van Straten, Ledgeview Town Chairman, and Mark Olsen, Ledgeview Park Committee Chairperson. The letter states that by summer of 2010, Ledgeview will have a minimum of 5 soccer fields located at either Ledgeview Park or Scray Hill Park, with plans for two additional fields underway. Practice areas are also available at Ledgeview Park. With this information, Ledgeview is requesting the City of De Pere remove the non-resident fee for Ledgeview youth in the soccer and baseball programs effective with 2010 season. Board suggested that if we eliminate the non-resident fees, then Ledgeview should contribute towards the annual subsidy that the City has given to the Soccer group. Mike Donovan made a motion to table this item and direct Staff to meet with the Town of Ledgeview regarding the waiving of non-resident fees beginning in 2010 for soccer. Staff will discuss with them that the City is not opposed to waiving these fees knowing that Ledgeview will have 5 soccer fields that could be used for the Soccer program; however, the City would discuss with Ledgeview that the City subsidizes the Rec Soccer program annually, and since Ledgeview would not be paying the non-resident fees, Ledgeview would be expected to pay their share of the subsidy to the Rec Soccer group. James Boyd seconded the motion. Motion passed.

#### 8. Election of Officers.

Sue Schinkten moved to nominate George Brown President; seconded by James Boyd. Motion passed. Kathy Van Vonderen moved to nominate Bill Volpano Vice President; seconded by Rod Kowalczyk. Motion passed. The term is one year.


